
**Scripture** ~ John 1 – Pr. Ashley Nicolls


## Scripture ~ The Registration - Pr. Ashley Nicolls

## Scripture ~ The Wise Men – Pr. Ashley Nicolls

In the time of King Herod, after Jesus was born in Bethlehem of Judea, wise men from the East came to Jerusalem, asking, “Where is the child who has been born king of the Jews? For we observed his star at its rising, and have come to pay homage.”

When King Herod heard this, he was frightened, and all Jerusalem with him; and calling together all the chief priests and scribes of the people, he inquired of them where the Messiah was to be born. They told him, “In Bethlehem of Judea: for so it has been written by the prophet.”

Then Herod secretly called for the wise men and learned from them the exact time when the star had appeared. He sent them to Bethlehem saying, “Go and search diligently for the child; and when you have found him bring me word so I may also go and pay homage.”

I am a wise man, apparently. Although they don't say that about everyone who looks for messages in the stars.

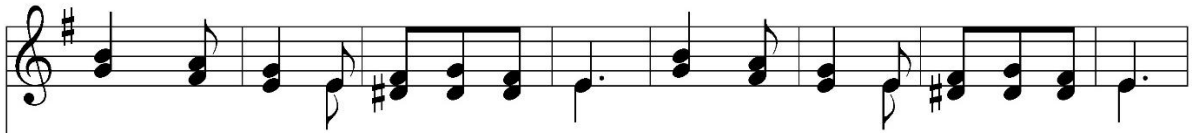
I am a traveler. My journey has brought me a long, long way. I have not found much yet: only power-hungry rulers, and too many doors shut in my face.

I am a foreigner. I might look and sound quite different from you. But just because I struggle to speak your language doesn't mean I don't have a brain, or a heart.

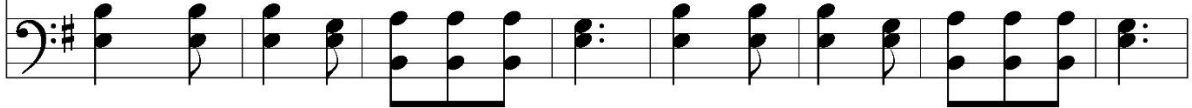
You and I are searching for the same thing, I think. A new government, perhaps; a different world, definitely; a brighter future, we hope.

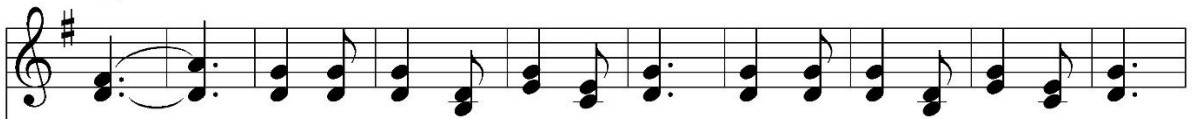

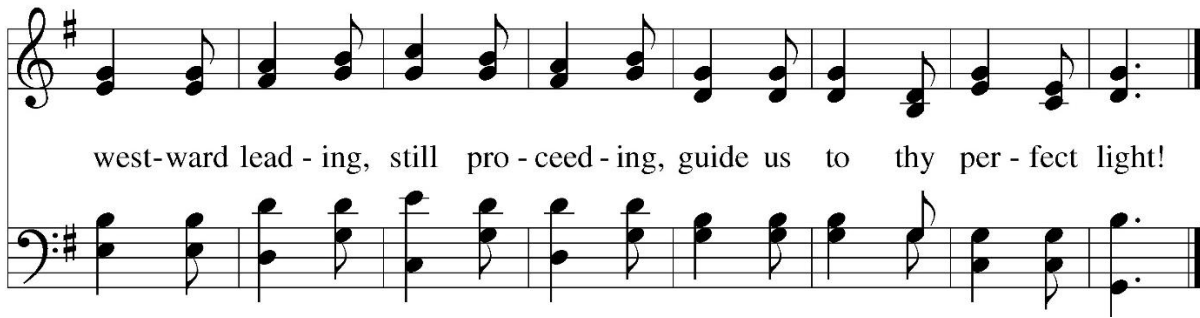
